### **Root Feeding Insects**

Ahmed

Flies often cause serious damage to plants by feeding on the underground parts of certain vegetables. These are the carrot fly, the onion fly and the cabbage root fly. These insects emerge in the Spring or early Summer and feed upon the underground parts of the plants.

The Carrot Fly: These tiny flies hatch out of eggs and first attack the tip of the carrot root, which they cut off later. They eat into the stouter parts of the roots and sometimes this can cause complete failure of the crop. Parsnips, celery and parsley may also be attacked.

<u>Control</u>: The aim of control treatments is to kill the flies before they lay eggs and before they attack the roots.


