




All good books are alike in that they are truer than if they had really happened.

This year's book seems to have grown perhaps reflecting how the scheme itself is getting bigger, now that we have moved to new premises.


Congratulations to everyone. Without the students' hard work, the tutors' support and everyone's best wishes, this would never have gotten off the ground.


So thank you for your courage to put pen and paper together and share your thoughts, feelings and ideas.
